Bored by his Biology class in high school in Oregon, Dr. Wilkinson's first real excitement about science didn't come until his 3rd year as an undergraduate at UCSB (in the late 1970s) when he learned about molecular biology. Feeding this interest were courses he took earlier on Physical Anthropology and Nutrition, where he learned about genetic mutations, primate evolution, and the Kreb (citric acid) cycle. Fueled by these various interests, Dr. Wilkinson did a full-time Honors course in Genetics for his final year of undergraduate studies at the University of Edinburgh, only 2 miles from where he was born. His Honor thesis project was focused on transposable elements (a topic he returned to recently that was made famous by the Nobel Prize winner, Barbara McClintock, who initially struggled to have her findings on "jumping genes" accepted).

Dr. Wilkinson then moved "down south" to University of Warwick in England to do his PhD studies. His initial interest was to do his dissertation on a "new topic" (at the time) of "genetic engineering," but his experiments took a turn and he ended up doing a cellular immunology project involving a potential cancer cure. Working in the UK was exciting, as it gave Dr. Wilkinson opportunities to attend conferences all across Europe. His PhD training gave him a foundation in immunology, which turned out to be critical for landing his first two faculty jobs, both of which required him to be the course director of different immunology courses (for medical, nursing, and graduate students).

# The seeds of Dr. Wilkinson's current research

Dr. Wilkinson's first post-doctoral position (in 1984) involved his traveling "across the pond" from Warwick, England to The Scripps Research Institute (TSRI) right here in San Diego. He chose to study underlying mechanisms causing breast cancer at TSRI but was disillusioned by the large lab (65 people!) and associated chaos. So, Dr. Wilkinson elected to quickly leave and do a second postdoc (in 1985) at the UCSD Cancer Center, which at that time was in Hillcrest. Working under the leadership of Dr. Carol MacLeod, Dr. Wilkinson focused on two main projects that he still works on (in highly "mutated" form") today.

One project involved cloning new genes, since at that time, "the genome" was not sequenced. Among the genes cloned by Dr. Wilkinson was an "oncofetal" gene that he named "reproductive homeobox gene on the X chromosome (Rhox)-5." After he moved to Oregon Health Sciences University (OHSU) as an Assistant Professor, his team discovered that Rhox5 encodes an important transcription factor that is specifically expressed in the reproductive tract. These studies led Dr. Wilkinson down the reproductive biology path, a field of investigation he has focused on ever since.


A major breakthrough made by Dr. Wilkinson's team after moving to M.D. Anderson Cancer Center (in 1994), was that Rhox5 is not an orphan homeobox genes (as Dr. Wilkinson originally thought), but instead it is part of a large gene cluster – indeed, it is the largest homeobox gene cluster in mammals. This finding has shaped much of his laboratory' work since then. The entire 33-gene Rhox cluster is selectively expressed in the male and female reproductive tracts (as well as placenta), leading to his laboratory's over-arching hypothesis that the genes in this giant X-linked cluster encode transcription factors devoted to regulating functions in reproduction. Testing this hypothesis has led Dr. Wilkinson's team to focus on spermatogonial stem cells (SSCs), which his team works on still today (<u>discover Wilkinson lab</u>). SSCs are a potential cure for some forms of infertility.

The other project that Dr. Wilkinson worked on as a post-doctoral fellow was "immune gene regulation." This project was focused on T-cell receptor (TCR) genes, which had only just been cloned at the time. Dr. Wilkinson discovered that a weird mechanism was negatively regulating non-productively rearranged TCR genes, but he couldn't figure out what the mechanism was. Not daunted by the challenge, Dr. Wilkinson continued working on this problem as an Assistant Professor at OHSU, where he and his team discovered that "the negative regulation" was a RNA decay mechanism that degrades "bad" mRNAs as well as an interesting subset of normal mRNAs. This RNA turn-over mechanism—later named "nonsense-mediated RNA decay (NMD)—has fascinated Dr. Wilkinson ever since. Several current projects in the laboratory revolve around the NMD pathway, including ascertaining its roles in germ cells and human evolution, as well as determining whether therapeutic manipulation of the NMD pathway can treat genetic diseases caused by nonsense and frameshift mutations (explore Wilkinson lab).





UC San Diego Health collaborates with our community to provide the Obstetrics (OB) Refugee and Asylee Case Navigation Program to deconstruct inequalities in disadvantaged vulnerable populations with increased susceptibility to socioeconomic impediments hindering ability to obtain high quality obstetrics care. Inclusive, efficient, and culturally aware healthcare is offered to our pregnant refugee and asylee patients. Launched in 2022 in response to escalating need, this transformative program assists with pediatric care for newborns in conjunction with providing infant care necessities (diapers, car seats, baby apparel, breast pumps, etc.). Prenatal through postpartum care advances equity for our patients while aiding community wellbeing.

### Program Overview


Rooted in equitable clinical innovation, the OB Refugee and Asylee Case Navigation Program bridges obstetrics care with patients who identify as a refugee or asylum seeker. At the heart of this program is the essential aspect of language and interpreter assistance where patients and their families clearly communicate to providers and care team in their native language. In most cases, our diverse and global cultures sensitive staff are proficient in patient dialects and can communicate effectively, breaking down barriers to miscomprehension. Nonverbal, visual-based communication tools are adopted to reduce ambiguity and foster rapport. To date, over 130 patients have benefited from this successful program.




# **Obstetrics and Gynecology (Generalist) division**






# Selemawit Ghebrendrias, MD

The Fundamental Critical Care Support (FCCS): Obstetrics course is designed for intensivists and non-intensivists who may provide maternal /fetal critical care and for clinicians in obstetrics seeking additional education in critical care.

The FCCS-OB course provides a combination of didactic lectures and hands-on skills stations with an emphasis on pregnant patients. The two-day, comprehensive curriculum offers an approach to initial management of the critically ill obstetrics patient for providers not formally trained in critical care.

Participants will learn useful information about the extended care of critically ill obstetrics patients, especially care related to mechanical ventilation, monitoring, organ hypoperfusion and neurological support. Providers will receive guidance for acute problems encountered in the ICU and for sudden obstetrics patient deterioration.
