Robert Resnik, MD (1938-2025)

Remembrance Dr. Robert Resnik: An Influential Ob/Gyn Giant and Genius Innovator

It was 1974 in San Diego – freshly nicknamed by the mayor as "America's Finest City" – and The School of Medicine had just set in motion its Medical Scientist Training Program for physician-scientists. Beckoned beach-side with the "Big Look" silhouette synonymous with the hallmark of an era, Dr. Robert Resnik's entrance was grand. He was a prestigious rocky-mountain NIH research fellow in Maternal-Fetal Medicine from snow-glistened Colorado with a residency and distinguished Clinical Instructor experience from Yale University School of Medicine and New Haven Hospital in Connecticut. His steps echoed in the hospital hallways as a beacon of light at Jacobs and Hillcrest and source of hope on his rounds as a Reproductive Medicine perinatologist saving high-risk pregnancies and navigating pregnancy complications with precision and intellect from an evidence-based, bench-to-bedside approach. As a chrysalis turns into a butterfly, throughout his time at UC San Diego, Dr. Robert Resnik was larger than life as a world-class clinician, translational scientist of significant contributions, and highly influential professor of reproductive medicine. Deeply revered for decades by colleagues, trainees, medical students, health care aficionados, and the community as a pantheon-of-legends 'Giant in Obstetrics and Gynecology', Dr. Resnik's story-telling persona resonated with others, ignited action towards continuous improvement, holistic patient care, and shaped a strong, positive culture of connection, service, and socially and emotionally-connected teamwork.

An innovator and pioneer post-residency, Robert Resnik, MD served as a Major in the U.S. Army at Walter Reed before embarking on an incredible journey and storied, board-certified career in obstetrics and gynecology with maternal-fetal medicine subspecialty that would be his true passion and forge his path from Assistant, to Associate, to full Professor, department Chair, and Associate Dean for Admissions at UC San Diego's School of Medicine. Aside from clinical practice, Dr. Resnik, a recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Society of Maternal-Fetal Medicine, made investigative research discoveries and passed his knowledge to next-generation clinicians as a textbook author consecutively updating editions of Maternal-Fetal Medicine: Principles and Practice, publishing his findings in medical journals, and presenting abstracts at scientific meetings. Research areas of estrogen-induced uterine blood flow, managing amniotic fluid embolism, organizing an obstetrical unit, placental oxygen transfer, maternal diseases associated with abnormal fetal growth, fetal lung maturation and the antenatal use of glucocorticoid, and operative obstetrics are just a fragment of Dr. Resnik's expertise and written guidance caring for humans and animals which have steered countless clinicians, fellows, residents, and scientists towards obstetrics and gynecology at UC San Diego. Dr. Resnik's impact is immeasurable and his skilled diagnostic, compassionate, and personable disposition legacy lives on supporting the bright future of maternal-fetal medicine.

The next time you stroll UC San Diego, take a peaceful moment to reflect on Dr. Robert Resnik's momentous and nuanced "giant" affiliative, people-first spirit of visionary leadership greatness that presented in the corridors and laid the foundation for generations of excellence and groundbreaking innovation still to come in obstetrics, gynecology, and reproductive sciences. "May his memory be a blessing."

Dr. Robert Resnik had a substantial impact, not only on trainees, fellows, and faculty at UCSD, but in the international sphere of Maternal-Fetal Medicine. Here are a few stories shared from colleagues in remembrance and in honor of Dr. Resnik's lasting legacy.

Remembrance from Dr. Charles Nager

"No one gave morning board rounds like Bob Resnik. In fact they were known as "Resnik Rounds". He would come in, someone would get him a cup of coffee and the interns and residents would present all the patient's on the labor board. If you were on call the night before you had better know all the patient details. Then, Bob would lecture on maternal-fetal physiology. He was a fountain of knowledge. One of his ex-fellows texted me last week and said Bob's physiology teaching shaped how he viewed everything in OB. I remember when I was a Sub-I and on board rounds Bob asked me about Fick's law and I just happened to know about it. From then on, I was in his good graces. He was a great mentor, friend, and colleague. The last few years were tough. I was devastated when he didn't remember me during this last year, but the great years far outnumbered the recent ones. Remembrance from Dr. William Parker

"In 1974, Dr. Resnik had just started as junior faculty. One of the other attendings was performing a scheduled Cesarean section and, as the lowly intern, I was nervously assisting. Right after the baby was delivered, the anesthesiologist started yelling for help, the woman had coded. Within 1-2 minutes Dr. Resnik ran in the room and started giving everyone orders. He orchestrated the entire code, and everyone listened. Amazingly, the woman survived an amniotic fluid embolus and left the hospital a few days later.

Dr. Resnik had given the patient intracardiac epinephrine and sent the syringe for analysis. It contained fetal cells, and the case was published as one of the first cases of patient survival following amniotic fluid embolus. Also, Dr. Resnik made his reputation that day. The Ob/Gyn department was astonished that the patient had survived and both anesthesia and medicine services were stunned that an Ob/Gyn knew how to run a code! He was that smart, that competent and earned everyone's respect from day one." – William Parker, MD **Robert Resnik, MD**

Remembrance from Dr. Thomas Kelly

"I first met Bob in 1984, when I was a medical student in Nevada. He visited monthly to teach their residents. When I asked him about UCSD he stated that they take the best students in the country as residents. A bit daunting to hear, but when I interviewed for a position a year later, my actual face time with him was no more than 2 minutes. Bob asked me if I wanted to come to UCSD, which of course I said yes. He then said, "I'll see what I can do". That was my entire interview.

Bob's legacy at UCSD certainly is more appreciated by those who have been here a while but should not be lost on those who haven't. He built this department, attracted outstanding people, taught and mentored them. He was an outstanding teacher. Every morning on L&D, there were "Board Rounds", an hour of pure education. Bob would take a single patient and break down not only the clinical aspects of management, but also the basic physiology of the obstetrical, medical or surgical condition. He also had high expectations for his residents. He set the bar high for the senior resident who presented during rounds. They had to know each patient's information by memory. He was the faculty staffing our High-Risk OB Clinic for many years, and taught a vast number of fellows, residents and medical students. When I became Division Director, I asked Bob to meet with our MFM fellows weekly and review a chapter from his book, Creasy and Resnik (the definitive text for MFM). This exercise became a "go to" event for them.

One of my favorite aspects about Bob was his storytelling. I loved listening to him talking about his training, working with other future leaders in OB/ GYN including Phil Disaia and Ed Qulligan. Despite being a brilliant and successful individual, he always had a self-deprecating nature, including any personal foibles in his stories. The most humorous involved him, George Leopold (Chair of Radiology) and Kurt Benirschke (a world-renowned perinatal pathologist who actually created the "Frozen Zoo" saving genetic material before IVF was a thing). The three went to the San Diego Zoo to perform an amniocentesis on a gorilla. The richness and humor involving 3 very wise men struggling to figure out how to complete this procedure was classic.

His mentoring of learners is well known. A number of his residents and fellows went on to become academic leaders. Furthermore, those who went into clinical practice were the best OB/GYNs at their respective hospitals. His personal stamp on their training was never forgotten. I remember times when former residents, now attendings, were sitting outside of his clinical office (like students waiting to see a principle in school) awaiting some form of feedback. He was always loyal to his learners, but never above delivering some tough love.

Over the years I was fortunate to develop a personal friendship with Bob and Lauren. They were very social. To get on their calendar took weeks as they always had events scheduled. I suspect that Doodle Polls were invented in part to figure out dinner plans with the Resniks."

His honorable commitment to exceptional patient care and seminal influence mentoring next generations of MFM fellows, residents, and medical students to become outstanding obstetricians/ gynecologists, perinatologists, and specialized clinicians has led to decades of "Best Doctors" local and national accolades and prestigious awards including: election to the UCSD Academy of Clinical Scholars, Ob/Gyn Residents' Appreciation Award, Joseph Didio Resident Teaching Award, CRE-OG Teaching Award, and APGO Award for Medical Student Teaching.

The skilled magnitude of Dr. Kelly's mastery, teaching influence, and invaluable contributions to the subspecialist field of maternal-fetal medicine leave an illuminated, guided path for future medical breakthroughs and improved pregnancy outcomes. As a board-certified urogynecologist and Clinical Professor of Ob/Gyn and Reproductive Sciences in the UC San Diego School of Medicine Department of Obstetrics, Gynecology, and Reproductive Sciences, Dr. Brubaker made her mark on the global medical community delivering the highest quality of women's healthcare while serving as an exemplary mentor Interim Chair for the Department of Obstetrics, Gynecology, and Reproductive Sciences and Director of Physician Wellness/Physician Wellness Steering Committee Chair for the health enterprise. Prior to her time at UCSD, Dr. Brubaker served for six years as the Dean of the Loyola University Stritch School of Medicine and their Interim Department Chair for Obstetrics & Gynecology.

Dr. Brubaker's multihyphenated leadership experience in clinical and academic settings in concert with novel research in human urobiome, recurrent UTI and bladder health has led to prolific achievement with a multitude of NIH awards, over 400 publications, the Jack Robertson Lifetime Achievement Award from the American Urogynecologic Society, the Chicago Health & Medicine Policy Research Group (HMPRG) Award, induction in AOA, Alpha Signma Nu, the Jesuit Honor Society, APGO Excellence in Teaching Award, Rush Medical College Distinguished Alumnus Award, and faculty teaching awards. She serves as the Consortium Chair and a PI for the NIDDK Prevention of Lower Urinary Track Symptoms (PLUS) Research Consortium, is Deputy Editor for JAMA, immediate past Editor in Chief for the Journal of Urogynecology, and has served as president and program chairs of the American Urogynecologic Society, the Society of Gynecologic Surgeons, the Division Director for the Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery (FPMRS) division of ABOG, and spearhead Urobiome 2025. 

H. Irene Su Lab at UC San Diego Generates Evidence-Informed Methods to Improve the Reproductive Health of Young People Surviving Cancer

Emerging Reproductive Endocrinology Science for Fertility Preservation

Board certified in reproductive endocrinology and infertility, H. Irene Su, MD, MSCE earned her medical degree at Albert Einstein College of Medicine before heading to the University of Pennsylvania for ob/gyn residency and fellowship in reproductive endocrinology and infertility. Dr. Su's passion for care of medically complex patients took root in the youngest of cancer patients for whom fertility preservation treatments can provide a chance to grow their families in the future.

At Penn, Dr. Su earned a Master's degree in clinical epidemiology and biostatistics, which laid the foundation for conducting clinical research to answer questions she encountered from taking care of patients. Back in the golden state, Dr. Su established her research group at UC San Diego where her training has translated to groundbreaking research discoveries on how to predict adverse reproductive outcomes and deliver evidence-informed care to every young cancer patient, regardless of where they are treated.

Dr. Su aligns her research goals with her patients' needs. At the bed-side, Dr. Su compassionately approaches difficult and complex conversations with young patients and their families. Together, they discuss reproductive risks and standard and experimental fertility preservation treatments, engage in shared decision-making with them on the appropriate fertility preservation care (including watchful waiting), and work on getting the care that patients choose. To this end, Dr. Su's research team of physicians, scientists, and trainees partnered with patients to use blood spots collected at home to estimate ovarian function after different types of cancer treatments, in order to counsel patients about their individualized risks. With cancer survivors and social work and nursing partners, Dr. Su's research group co-developed ways to screen for reproductive health needs across variable clinic settings and provide evidence-informed materials to support frontline counseling and self-management of reproductive health issues (www.oncofertilityrisk.com). In several clinical trials, these materials improve the reproductive health of young breast cancer survivors.

To deliver fertility preservation services that patients need, UC San Diego offers the breadth of established fertility preservation services including oocyte and embryo freezing, ovarian tissue freezing and transplantation, and sperm and testicular tissue freezing in state-of-the-art laboratories. Engaging these services is not simply a matter of what the patient needs but also how quickly and affordably these services can be delivered. Dr. Su's research team is addressing the gap in care by testing electronic health record enabled pathways among oncology, fertility and financial teams across three different types of hospitals. If successful, this model of care can be scaled beyond our current Southern California catchment area. Most recently, state lawmakers have passed laws to provide insurance coverage for fertility preservation, but on the ground, clinicians reported that patients were still not able to afford services. The research team then set out to understand what are the steps that need to happen for a law to reach the patient and develop tools to help insurance regulators, clinical societies, insurers, and clinics to enable patients to access fertility preservation coverage and protect their reproductive futures.





New for 2025

New for 2025, the Fourth Trimester Program at UC San Diego Health is designed to meet the complex needs of the community and bridge the care gap during the significant postnatal period from birth through the early postpartum period. The program provides care navigation services supplementing and expanding upon the traditional post-delivery care model where patients are typically not seen until six weeks after birth. When the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology (ACOG) updated their postpartum care paradigm, the Fourth Trimester Program was designed in response with a pilot groundbreaking and evolving offering of a joint postpartum-newborn clinic.

"This program offers wrap-around services including care navigation. This program was developed to provide early, holistic, and longitudinal postpartum care for birthing people at the same time and in the same place as infant care." – Sarah Averbach, MD, MAS

Who qualifies?

Postpartum patients experiencing acute issues or who had complex pregnancies or deliveries and who are within 8 weeks of birth meet with an Obstetrics provider, a Pediatric provider certified in lactation consults, and a Registered Nurse navigator in a single visit. At discharge from birth, insured patients can be referred for follow-up care via EPIC for "Fourth Trimester Program."

Clinical assessments at 4th Trimester visits encompass:

Early postpartum patient

- 1. Blood pressure check and management
- 2. Wound care check and management
- 3. Early postpartum family planning
- 4. Management of medical conditions affected in the postpartum period
- 5. Lactation consult
- 6. Mental health concerns

<u>Infant</u>

- 1. Well infant initial visit
- 2. Growth check
- 3. Jaundice
- 4. Reflux
- 5. Sleep issues
 6. Umbilical cord issues
- 7. Rash

Patients seen at the Fourth Trimester Clinic will be linked to other needed services including: Maternal Mental Health, Pelvic Medicine, Physical Therapy, Primary Care, Postpartum Doula Services, and more.

Throughout the Year—and During BMHW—We Focus on:



FUNDAMENTAL CRITICAL CARE SUPPORT: OBSTETRICS

The Fundamental Critical Care Support (FCCS): Obstetrics course is designed for intensivists and non-intensivists who may provide maternal /fetal critical care and for clinicians in obstetrics seeking additional education in critical care.

The FCCS-OB course provides a combination of didactic lectures and hands-on skills stations with an emphasis on pregnant patients. The two-day, comprehensive curriculum offers an approach to initial management of the critically ill obstetrics patient for providers not formally trained in critical care.


Participants will learn useful information about the extended care of critically ill obstetrics patients, especially care related to mechanical ventilation, monitoring, organ hypoperfusion and neurological support. Providers will receive guidance for acute problems encountered in the ICU and for sudden obstetrics patient deterioration.




